Dr. Mae Jemison served six years as a NASA astronaut, becoming the first woman of color to go into space with her mission aboard Space Shuttle *Endeavor* and the only astronaut to appear on *Star Trek*. Today, Jemison leads 100 Year Starship®, a bold new initiative to assure the capabilities exist for human travel to another star within the next 100 years. Trained as an engineer, social scientist and dancer, Jemison is also a medical doctor who was the Area Peace Corps Medical Officer for Sierra Leone and Liberia. In addition, Jemison is one of the most highly sought after speakers on issues of sustainability, advanced technology, science education and science literacy, diversity and social responsibility.

Who is your favorite character from fiction, and why?

I can't name just one, but all have the same qualities: intelligence, physical stamina, perseverance, strong sense of self, determination and courage. Ellen Ripley in the Alien movie series; Hush Puppy in Beasts of the Southern Wild and Lyra Belacqua from Philip Pullman's His Dark Materials series. When was the last time you were truly impressed? Audra McDonald is amazing in Lady Day at Emerson's Bar and Grill. What cause do you most identify with?
